Low Level

A couplet is made up of two lines that rhyme. Writing couplets is a great way to practice poetry!

1. What do you want to write about? Your couplet can be about anything – a person, an object, or even an idea. How about the sun?
2. Once you've decided on a topic, write your first line of poetry about that topic. Remember that you will have to rhyme with your last word. Don't pick anything too difficult!

Nothing can grow.

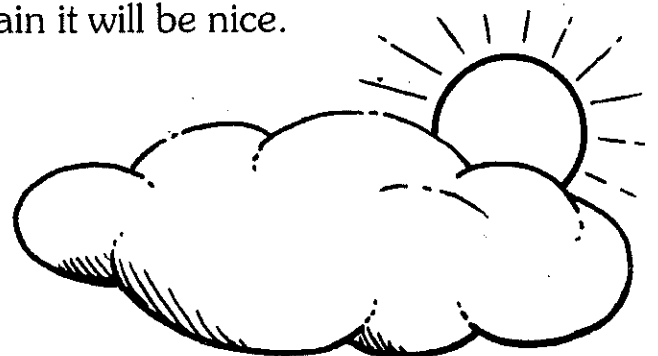
The colors come out
